Founder Rebecca Onie learned that a medical approach does not always solve a child’s chronic health problems if the family is deciding between paying rent, putting food on the table, or paying for a prescription. Today, nearly 1,000 student volunteers help tens of thousands of people obtain critical resources every year through Health Leads’ Family Help Desks, and a new generation of leaders is being trained to change the system of health care delivery in this country.
